AIR LINES (AMATEUR BANDS).

Chief interest on 14 m/cs recently has centred round two stations operated by ON4QF. The first, 7B4QF in Andorra, is the first station known to have operated from this tiny Pyrenean state since before the war. After a few days there, QF. moved to Monaco, where he operated on 3A2AC. 2 YS worked 7B4QF with literally two minutes to spare -just before he had to dash off to work on the morning that 4QF closed down. With 3A2AC he was luckier, and 'bagged' him as soon as he came on the air-the receiver just happened to be tuned to that frequency !
