Meeting News. We were given a very interesting lecture on October 16th, the subject being "Direction Finding". Two Members of our friendly rivals, the Wirral Club, stimulated our interest in what up to the present has not been a part of our Club activities. With some amusing anecdotes by Basil O'Brien the lecture October 22nd was spent on making an inventory of the various parts required for the proposed transmitter. On November 6th, Dennis Rickers and Ted Elphick bludgeoned all and sundry into being Quiz Kids, probably it was fortunate for them that there was no throwing ammunition at hand, or we should probably have re-lived our school days. The next week was spent on the winter work project. Film Strips dealing with the origin, application and construction of Mullard Cathode Ray Tubes were shown on November 20th.
